Who we are

Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks manages, maintains and develops the electricity networks which bring power to 3.8 million homes and businesses in the north of Scotland and central southern England.

Our engineers take care of around 130,000 kilometres of wires and cables, and over 100,000 substations. We work hard to ensure our networks are as reliable as possible and invest millions of pounds every year to upgrade and improve the electricity supplies within our

transmission and distribution areas.

We pride ourselves not just on working in our communities, but being part of them as well. Our skilled teams are based right across the regions we serve, supported by engineering and customer service teams based in major offices and depots in centres like Reading, Portsmouth, Perth and Inverness.

Our first priority is to provide a safe and reliable supply of electricity to the communities we serve.

Building resilience

At Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks, extreme weather is something we expect and prepare for. Whether it's gale-force winds, floods or sub-zero temperatures, weather conditions present a significant challenge to our business, and it's a challenge we share with the communities we serve.

We regularly invest in the network to ensure it is as reliable it can be, but when the weather works against us and electricity supplies are interrupted, we're committed to providing our communities with the support they need to stay resilient whilst we work to restore power as quickly and safely as possible.

This work includes on-the-ground support from our community and customer service teams to help with resilience planning and co-ordination, but we recognise that sometimes communities require financial assistance too.

That's why we set up the Resilient Communities Fund, which provides grants of up to £20,000 for local resilience projects. Over the past four years we've funded some invaluable projects through the scheme; from flood defences, to snow ploughs, and rescue boats - which now play an important role in supporting the local response in emergency situations.

The fund also supports wider forms of resilience too, inviting applications from projects that encourage community cohesion, so that all community members are supported, and funding initiatives that are targeted to those in most need, such as the fuel poor or elderly.

This report details some of the projects we've supported across our north of Scotland and central southern England regions since the fund launched in 2015, demonstrating the great work of local organisations in making sensible

preparations and galvanising their resources for whatever the weather might bring.

In recognition of its success, we've extended the Resilient Communities Fund until 2023 so that we can continue to help build resilience in the regions we serve.

We look forward to supporting many more projects in the years to come.

About the Fund

The Resilient Communities Fund is a competitive grant-making fund which opens once a year to not-for-profit community groups and charities in our electricity distribution network areas in central southern England and the north of Scotland.

What does the fund support?

The fund provides grants of between £1,000 and £20,000 to support projects that achieve one of the following criteria:

- 1. Vulnerability To protect the welfare of vulnerable community members through enhancing their resilience and improving community participation and effectiveness.
- 2. Resilience for Emergency Events To enhance community facilities, services and communication specifically to support the local response in the event of a significant emergency event.

How is the fund managed?

The fund is overseen by an internal funding team who provide advice and support to applicants at all stages of the process, including training on emergency resilience plans.

Two independent judging panels, one north and one south, review applications and determine which projects should receive funding. The panels comprise representatives with expertise in community resilience planning, including Scottish Government, British Red Cross and National Energy Action, alongside members of the SSEN management team.

How are fund priorities set?

Each year we consult with a broad range of stakeholders including national and local government, community members and past applicants to set the priorities for the fund in each network area.

We've also developed a Vulnerability Mapping Tool with Dundee University. This tool is used to identify communities who have low resilience, support them to apply to the fund, and to inform the panel of the resilience rating of each area.

Our funding process

1: Priorities Setting

An annual stakeholder consultation sets fund priorities. Specific regional needs considered.

2: Open Applications

Fund opens for 12 weeks. Guidance offered on project specifications and application submissions

3: Independent Panel

Grant decisions made by expert independent panel based on fund priorities.

4: Ongoing Support

Guidance from our customer relationship managers and access to resilience support services.

Regional trends

The fund has identified several trends across central southern England:

1. Communication is vital

From ensuring local radio stations can continue operation during emergencies, to providing the latest technology latest communication technology, it's clear that frequent information exchange in emergencies is essential. We have also seen a growth in requests for multi-charge points at emergency hubs.

2. Sharing best practice

The fund benefits from resilience information sharing which happens at local and regional level. An innovative award to one community can act as a catalyst for improved resilience across an entire local authority area.

3. Supporting medical emergencies

A common concern for communities is dealing with an unexpected medical emergency. Communities have been preparing for such events through a range of first aid training, supporting medical volunteers and the purchase of medical equipment.





Surrey Search and Rescue

£17,028 awarded in September 2017

Water rescue services in Surrey improved through new communication equipment.

Surrey Search and Rescue covers the whole of the south east and have been called into neighbouring Hampshire, Berkshire and Wiltshire to assist Police. The new communication equipment enhances the team's capacity to respond to emergencies. This has allowed the team to respond quicker and be deployed within minutes.

"The digital repeater network gives us the ability to talk to from one side of the county to the other to coordinate our response. The GPS unit built into each radios keeps our crew safer as we can now track them in real-time from the command unit. It also helps when our crews find the missing person as we know instantly where they are and the location of the nearest teams we can deploy to support with casualty care." Monkton Farleigh Parish Council

£2,261 awarded in September 2017

Resilience to heavy snow strengthened through the purchase of a snow blade.

Monkton Farleigh is a Wiltshire rural community of around 400 people, which has experienced difficulties due to heavy snowfall and its elevated position. Through the fund, they were able to purchase a snow blade, which could be affixed to the front of a tractor. This would allow them to clear snow from roads and other important access areas. When the Beast from the East hit the country in early March 2018, the blade was deployed to clear snow which had made the main street and access roads impassable.

"We deployed the snow plough only days after its arrival and were able to keep the village functioning as envisaged in our emergency plan. Without the SSEN Resilience Fund a small community such as ours would have been unable to afford such a useful piece of equipment."

Serve On £19,979 awarded in September 2018

Communities will benefit from a comprehensive resilience training programme.

Serve On is a local charity which supports the resilience of communities in Wiltshire and Salisbury. They have employed a Training Officer to enhance the training on offer to local volunteers. 100 volunteers will benefit from a range of training on a range of resilience themes including personal resilience, power and lighting, and first aid.

Regional trends

The fund has been able to support communities across the geographically disparate network region in the north of Scotland. The following trends have been identified:

1. Supporting remote communities

The unique resilience needs of the Scottish islands are a key focus. A common area of concern is having reliable power during extreme weather and SSEN has provided generator equipment which has enabled vital services including GP practices, welfare services and resilience hubs to operate safely.

2. Enhancing emergency services

The remote communities in the north of Scotland can experience extended waiting times for emergency services during extreme weather events and several applications have focused on building emergency services capacity.

3. Funding regional projects

The fund has supported projects which build capacity across the whole north of Scotland region including increasing the capacity of the Scotlish Flood Forum and funding the Rural Watch Service managed by Neighbourhood Watch Scotland.





Isle of Bute Resilience Team £3,686 awarded in September 2018

An island community will benefit from enhanced resilience capacity.

The island of Bute can become cut off in the event of a storm. The local community council prepared the Bute Emergency Plan following a major severe weather power outage and disruption in January 2012 but resilience capacity continued to be an issue during an emergency. The grant has enabled the gap to be filled by the purchase of resilience equipment, volunteer protective clothing and range of volunteer

Pillar Kincardine

£14,274 awarded in September 2017

People with mental health difficulties in Aberdeenshire have improved resilience thanks to specialist action plans.

Pillar Kincardine is a voluntary organisation based in Stonehaven, Aberdeenshire which supports people coping with serious emotional, social or mental health difficulties. This project allows members to meet with representatives of emergency services and SSEN's customer relationship manager in an informal setting and breaks down barriers to communication on both sides, equipping members with information and practical advice for their personal action plans. The project supports 90 local residents.

Free national power cut number

105 is the number to call if there's a power cut. You can call 105 to report a power cut or find out information about power interruptions in your local area.

You can also call 105 if you spot damage to electricity power lines and substations that could put you, or someone else, in danger. Remember, always keep a safe distance from potential hazards.
